Unit Cost Estimating for Road Maintenance

- ▶ TIBC Transportation Subcommittee, 2016
 - Established March 2016
 - Purpose to analyze, record, and develop data for road maintenance budget needs
 - Recommendation
 - Reporting Cost for each Maintenance Activity
 - A process of data reporting from the local tribal/agency level programs on actions and functions would give added credibility to budget requests
 - The data reporting should include costs for <u>each</u> maintenance activity

Project Cost Estimating/Unit Costs

- TIBC Transportation Subcommittee
 - Recommendation
 - Reporting Cost for each Maintenance Activity
 - Data reporting must be completely voluntary
 - Data tools could be made available to tribes to track this information from the BIA or could be possible using recommended data tools from tribes and current industry systems.
 - A consistent set of data would be gathered and reported to DOI/BIA for use by TIBC, OMB and USDOT. All tribes could participate, with emphasis on the 60 tribes that have 85+% of BIA roads/bridges

Project Cost Estimating/Unit Costs

- Reporting Cost for each Maintenance Activity
 - Data reporting should include, but not limited to, a specific set of data that could include:
 - Miles of BIA roads (and Tribal) maintained
 - By surface type, maintenance activity (blading of earth and gravel roads, paved road repairs, bridge maintenance and repairs), and hours of work on maintenance activities (mowing, snow/ice removal, bridge and administration)
 - Fuel Consumption/Reporting, Costs
 - Equipment Maintenance/ Repairs/Needs
 - Emergency Maintenance Costs
 - Total Costs of each activity
- This data would especially pinpoint individual emergency and snow removal activity costs.

Project Cost Estimating/Unit Costs

- TIBC Transportation Subcommittee
 - Recommendation
 - Reporting Cost for each Maintenance Activity
 - Full committee approval of Pilot for data collection on Great Plains Region
 - Purpose: To explore voluntary options for reporting RM data at a tribal level to identify an improved estimate for budget planning and needs (cost of maintaining facilities, cost of administration, and performance)

BIA - Study of Road Maintenance on Indian Land

Road Maintenance Study Sec. 14006

- Not later than 2 years from enactment of IIJA, the Secretary, in consultation with the Secretary of Transportation, shall carry out a study to evaluate:
 - the long-term viability and useful life of existing roads on Indian land;
 - any steps necessary to achieve the goal of addressing the deferred maintenance backlog of existing roads on Indian land;
 - programmatic reforms and performance enhancements necessary to achieve the goal of restructuring and streamlining road maintenance programs on existing or future roads located on Indian land; and
 - recommendations on how to implement efforts to coordinate with States, counties, municipalities, and other units of local government to maintain roads on Indian land.

- Tribal consultation & input. Before the study begins:
 - Consult with Indian tribes that have jurisdiction over roads eligible for funding under the road maintenance program of the BIA; and
 - Solicit and consider the input, comments, and recommendations of the Indian tribes described above.
- Upon completion, the Secretaries shall submit the report to:
 - The Committee on Indian Affairs and Environment and Public Works of the Senate; and
 - The Committees on Natural Resources and Transportation and Infrastructure of the House of Representatives
- Status reports are due:
 - Not later than 2 years after the date of enactment of this Act, and
 - Not less frequently than every 2 years thereafter,
 - The Secretaries shall submit to the Committees on Indian Affairs, Environment and Public Works of the Senate <u>and</u> the Committees on Natural Resources and Transportation and Infrastructure of the House of Representatives

- Tribal consultation & input. Before the study begins:
 - initial roll-out of "RM Study" performed at various Regional meetings and symposiums, as well as National level organizations (TIBC, TTPCC) in FY22 and early FY23
 - these sessions are ongoing
 - in-person symposiums/conferences have restarted
- Upon completion, the Secretaries shall submit the report to:
 - Report will be generated at conclusion consultations
- Status reports are due:
 - Not later than 2 years after the date of enactment

Status reports: Includes a description of:

- 1. The progress made towards addressing the deferred maintenance needs of the roads on Indian land, including a list of projects funded during the fiscal period covered by the report;
- 2. The outstanding needs of the roads that have been provided funding to address the deferred maintenance needs;
- 3. The remaining needs of any of the projects referred to in the paragraph 1;
- 4. How the goals described in subsection (b) have been met including
 - A. An identification and assessment of any deficiencies or shortfalls in meeting the goals; and
 - B. A plan to address the deficiencies or shortfalls in meeting the goals
- 5. Any other recommendations provided by an Indian tribe under the consultation and input process under subsection (c) that the Secretary determines to be appropriate.
